## The participants

Originally from Washington, DC, **Mark Sheridan** is a Benedictine monk in the Holy Land and professor emeritus in the Faculty of Theology of the Pontificio Ateneo S. Anselmo, Rome, where he served as dean of the Faculty of Theology (1998-2005) and Rector Magnficus (2005-2009) of the Athenaeum. He continues his research in the areas of Coptology and ancient Christian literature. Among his publications are: *Rufus of Shotep. Homilies on the Gospels of Matthew and Luke. Introduction, Text, Translation, Commentary* (Roma, 1998) [Sahidic texts of the sixth century C.E.] and *From the Nile to the Rhone and Beyond: Studies in Early Monastic Literature and Scriptural Interpretation* (Studia Anselmiana 156; Roma, 2012). **Dimitrios Moschos** is Associate Professor of Church Histoty in the Faculty of Theology at the National and Kapodistrian University of Athens and private lecturer (Privatdozent) at the Theological Faculty of Rostock University in Germany. His research interests focus on the interrelation between broader religious and cultural currents like ascetism or Greek philosophy and institutional and social transformations within the Christian Church.

Alexandros Tsakos has studied History and Archaeology in Greece and Ancient Religions in Belgium. He holds a PhD from Humboldt University, Berlin, on Greek manuscripts from medieval Sudan. Since 2008, he is living in Bergen, Norway, where in 2011 he founded with his wife, Henriette Hafsaas-Tsakos, the Organization for Greek-Norwegian Cooperation in the fields of Culture and Humanities. He is currently a postdoc researcher at the Institute of Archaeology, History, History of Art, and Religion at the University of Bergen, with the project Religious Literacy of Christian Nubia.





**Nikolaos Kouremenos** earned his PhD degree in Oriental Ecclesiastical Sciences at the Pontifical Institute of Rome in 2014. His dissertation was the *editio priceps* of the Coptic Passion of Saint Philotheus of Antioch. He specializes in Early Oriental Christian Literature, mainly in Coptic and Syriac literary productions. He is currently a postdoctoral fellow at the Research Centre for the Humanities (Athens) focusing his research on the formation of the Coptic identity within the Coptic literature during the 6th and 7th centuries.
